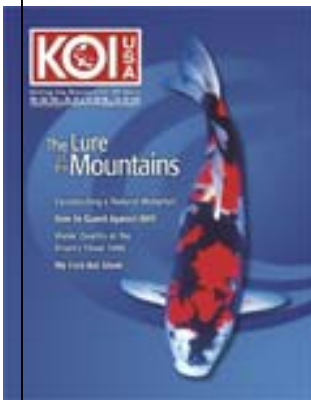


Got Signs???

February Pond Planning

I hope everyone who attended the January meeting enjoyed “How the East was Won”. It was a fascinating look at how things are done at top levels of the Japanese koi show scene. By the time you are reading this, you may know how much your tax refund will be. I hope it is a biggie!!! The combination of a refund and temperatures warming in March may just mean you are considering a new pond or a major pond redo. In either case, remember that classic statement from Peter Waddington, “The cheapest pond is the one you build once.”

So with that in mind, the February program will be based on two videos on koi pond construction. I will try to start the first video as the Executive Committee meeting begins at 1pm. The second video will be started after we have conducted the business portion of the general meeting. Each video is around 1 hour long.

Did you know that pond system planning is probably the best prophylactic for ponds. Remember the definition of prophylactic: “A preventive measure. The word comes from the Greek for “an advance guard,” an apt term for a measure taken to fend off a disease or another unwanted consequence. “If we properly build and maintain the homes of our fish, we will go a long way in keeping them healthy.”

Here are few pond system topics you might consider for your koi pond project:

The location is suitable for a koi pond system: Are you too close to property lines? Is the area fenced or needs to be fenced as part of the project? Can you easily view the pond and access the filter area? Do you need approvals/permits, from your HOA, city, or county?

The size of the pond is suitable for the number of koi you plan to keep: Typically you want at least 250 gallons for each adult koi, while more gallons per fish always being better.

The filtration system is external (not in the pond), and is dimensioned to handle twice the number of fish you plan to put in the pond. Why twice? Because there is no such thing as too much filtration....we all tend to overstock our ponds and overfeed the fish.



The filtration system should perform two major functions: First, gently capture and remove all solids from the water. No solids are left in the pond to decay. Second, media surface area is provided as home for bacteria that converts ammonia to nitrite to nitrate. Remember you cannot over filter a koi pond.

The aeration system should maintain dissolved oxygen levels at 80% of saturation: Both koi and the filter bacteria are major consumers of oxygen. The aeration system includes air domes on the bottom drains, air stones in filter chambers, water falls, shower filters, trickle towers and other devices to aerate the water. Remember you cannot over aerate a koi pond system.

Koi need depth and current: Koi evolved in rivers with strong current and water depth. They need both current and significant water depth to exercise both their muscles and their swim bladders. We should always make a koi pond at least 4' deep with 6' being all the better. The current can easily be provided by running air domes on the bottom drains, using tangential pond returns (TPR) which are jets that return the pond to the pond from the filter system. The currents from the air domes and TPR exercise the koi, move sinking debris to the bottom drains, and rotate new water to the surface for gas exchange. It's all good!

Peter Waddington's classic book [Koi Kichi](#) is still relevant for designing and building koi pond systems. There are new books such as [The Essential Book of Koi](#) that do have more up to date filters products included. Peter Waddington has just released his new book [Koi Crazy](#) in the UK. It should be available in the US within a few months. Be sure to put it on your koi library wish list. And probably the single best site for planning a koi pond system is still the Welsh site <http://www.koicymru.co.uk/construct.htm>. Be sure to check out all the pages on that site.

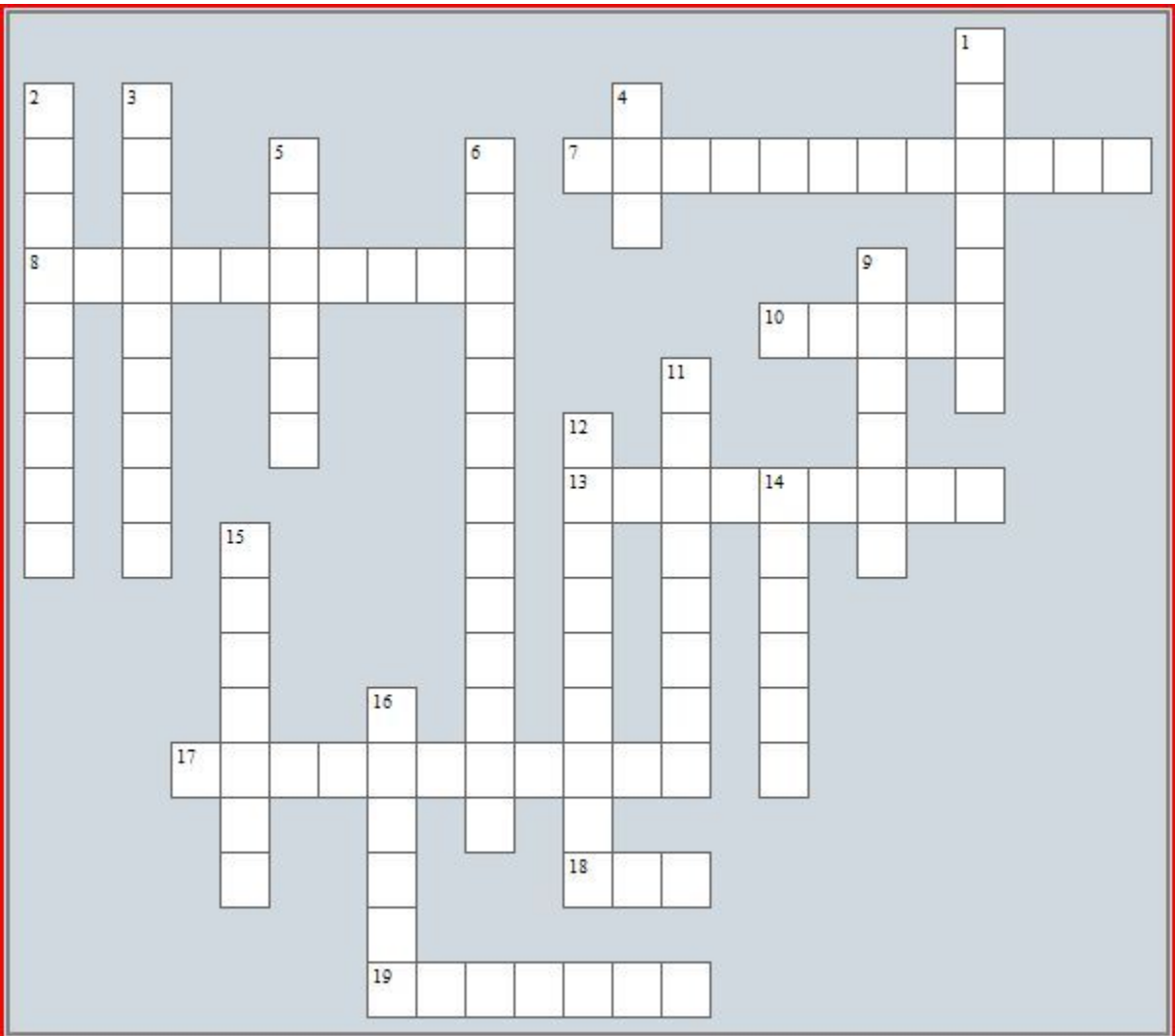
