





The Atlas of Garden Ponds, (Dr. Herbert R. Axelrod is one of the authors), details techniques, filters and layouts for ponds with the distinct


purpose of keeping the pond water crystal clear. These

Something's Fishy — More Variety Information

Beautiful, beautiful Bekko, (sing to tune of "Beautiful Blue Eyes")
Beautiful, beautiful Bekko,
Beautiful, beautiful Bekko,
I'll never love Utsuris again....

The koi fashionistas have struck again. The once wildly popular Bekko has lost favor in the eyes of "THOSE" experts who decide which fish are most important. The Utsuri has taken its place. Bekkos were once so popular that they even have a class in koi shows named for them! It's rather sparsely populated now. Sad, but true.

Bekkos come in three body color combinations: white with black (Shiro Bekko), red with black (aka Bekko), and the rarest lemon yellow with black (Ki Bekko). Bekkos differ from Utsuris in that Utsuris are BLACK fish with different color trim... while Bekkos are one of the solid colors with black trim. The black (sumi) should resemble tortoiseshell, and be on the back and above the lateral line. Sumi should not be on the head — though a touch of it is often overlooked. Shiro Bekkos should also have a "color" space (which ever color the fish is) between the last sumi marking and the beginning of the tail. This gives the eye a rest.

Bekkos come in scaled, doitsu, gin-rin, and etc. They are judged — as are all koi — on the quality of the skin and the confirmation of the fish. Many of them have blue eyes. Bekkos— try them, you'll like them.

Hikarimuji — a solid choice.....

Hikari means shining in Japanese. Hikarimuji fish are one-color fish with a dull all-over metallic glow. The most common fish from this group is the *ogon*. Matsubas are anther branch of this group. — in spite of what looks to us to be two colors .

Ogons as we know them were developed beginning in 1921. The original breed pair were a Magoi with gold stripes on its back and a Magoi. Only fish with yellow scales were kept and bred. The first true ogons were produced in 1946. Early Ogons were golden, but often turned blackish in warm water. This trait was bred out by 1957.

Most ponds have a Yamabuki Ogon. The sunshine yellow brightens the pond and gives a rest from the now favored go sanke group.

How do you choose a good Yamabuki Ogon? Look for a fish with "presence". If you can get a jumbo — do so. Often the ones with broad shoulders and thick tails even when young — are good choices. Look for flawless skin and a head that is helmet shaped. Any flecks of color other than yellow lowers their value. Be sure to check for all fins — sometimes over breeding

eliminates the pelvic fins — and that's a major flaw. Well developed pectoral fins are a must.

Platinum Ogons have a dull luster coupled with a metallic shine. This characteristic is known as Fukurin —gives the Ogon a 3-D effect. These are white fish with the luster of precious metal.

Ogons may be scaled or doitsu. Both types are put together for judging purposes in shows. These fish may have the large "German" scales down their back or be totally scale less leather carp.

Ok, if you've hung in this far ... just a bit more won't hurt. Here's where things get confusing. Matsubas are solid color fish. Yes, they have black tipped scales, but the Japanese call this a single color. Are you with me? Now, if a Matsuba is metallic — then it's a Hikarimuji. If it's a matt-scaled fish, it's a Kawarimono. Don't ask. I don't know why.
