## July's Social meeting

A good time was had by all of the 44 members at the Summer Social held at the house of the "Two Davids" (Pugh and Boyd, that is) on July 12th. The temperature was a balmy 90 degrees, but cooling was furnished by a brief sprinkle or two. A pot luck dinner satisfied the palates of every diner. Their pond contains 9,000 gallons, and is constructed of rubber-lined landscaping blocks, half above and half below grade. It is said to contain 16 KOI, with the oldest one obtained in 2007. Filtration is provided by two large vortex filters and one CETUS prefilter. Since the filtration system is above ground, and at water level, the total flow is handled by only two 1/8Hp pumps. This is awesomely efficient!!!! And thank you "Davids" for hosting this spectacular event.

#### A Hidden Cost of Maintaining a Pond

If a stockbroker offered you a fund that provides a steady 24% return each and every year, tax-free, wouldn't you buy it? Great deals like this are also available through good pond management, and a knowledge of how to calculate operating costs. Consider one of the hidden costs of pond management.....electricity.

Did you realize that even a high performance 1/2 Hp pump costs \$47.28/month to operate?

Or a 1/3 Hp pump costs \$35.09/month to operate?

Or a 1/4 Hp pump costs \$28.20/month to operate?

Or a 1/8 Hp pump costs \$19.08/month to operate?

Most filter pumps are at least 1/3 Hp, with some exceeding 1 Hp. They may provide a lot of flow, but the proper adapting of pump curves might go a long way toward reducing the hidden cost of energy. There is a technical method and a "gut method" to determine the pump size that best fits your need:

#### **Technical Method:**

1. Determine the flow rate (gallons per hour) that you need (usually about 1-2 water changes per hour).

- 2. Determine the pump pressure needed to push the water through the system. A pressure gauge located at the present pump output will provide this.
- 3. Obtain a copy of the pump curve supplied with your pump. A typical pump curve will provide the flow versus the head (in feet or psi). For instance, for a 6,000 gallon pond will need a pump capacity of 50gpm to provide 1 water change per hour, or 100gpm for 2 water changes per hour (volume x (Number of water changes per hour desired)/60)
- 4. Decide what size of pump will fit your needs. You may be surprised that a smaller pump will suffice.

The other method is to do a "gut feel" a just choose a smaller pump. But beware that the cost of a new pump/strainer assembly will cost about \$700.

#### What are the savings?


- Electrical costs are \$0.106/kw-hr (Georgia Power)
- 1/3 Hp pump consumes 360kw-hr/month (kw x 24 x 30)
- 1/8 Hp pump consumes 225kw-hr/month
- Savings are 135kw-hr/month
- @\$0.106/kw-hr = \$14.31/month (or \$171.72/year) (a 4-year pay-back)

This is one example. Your situation may vary. Most systems employ larger pumps, but might not be able to reduce the capacity much.

# How do we measure the power we are consuming?

If your pump has a plug, its power consumption may simply be measured by plugging in a KILL-A-WATT meter costing about \$28 (Amazon, FRY's, and others).

It reads voltage, watts, kilowatts, and even costs per hour on some models.
