

What is Dropsy?

A very common word in the fish hobby is the term "dropsy." What does this term mean? Well, to start off, "dropsy" is **NOT a disease**. "Dropsy" describes a condition where a fish's body balloons outward and their scales start to stick out, looking like a pinecone. This syndrome is caused by excess water in the body cavity or coelom. Excess water collects in the skin between the scales and around the internal organs causing the traditional "dropsy" appearance.

This presentation is merely a sign of poor kidney function. Freshwater fish live in an environment that is less dense than their bodies. Through passive diffusion, water is constantly trying to even out the fish's density by pulling water into the body tissues, mainly the skin and gills. A freshwater fish's kidney works very hard to remove excess water and pass it back out into the environment with other waste. If the kidneys are not functioning correctly, water is not removed effectively and the fish starts taking on water.

Many different disease processes can cause this syndrome, including stress from poor water quality, inadequate diet, tank mate aggression, tumors, parasites, viruses and bacteria. "Dropsy," or more clinically edema, is simply a sign that there is something wrong affecting the kidneys and not a specific disease process.

When your fish takes on this appearance, **don't assume it will be corrected by dumping in antibiotics**. Not only is this harmful to your fish, but it gives owners unnecessary exposure to the drugs as well. Not to mention that all OTC fish meds are not controlled or evaluated in ANY way. Start by checking your water parameters, evaluating your fish's diet and making sure no one is picking on them. If you do not find a clear cause, contact your local fish veterinarian.

UV Dimensioning Michael Anderson

For UV dimensioning we can use the information provided by one of the major UV vendors, AquaUltraviolet, on their public website. Similar information may be available from other UV vendors. In their Sizing Chart there are four columns. The first column is the model of UV unit which includes the wattage. The second column is the range of pond gallonage were the unit will an effective sterilizer. A sterilizer should not only kill algae but also a number of different pathogens (bacteria and viruses) that pass through the unit. The third column is the maximum flow rate for which the unit can be an effective sterilizer. The fourth column shows the maximum pond gallonage and flow rate for the UV unit to be an effective clarifier which kills algae, not bacteria or viruses. Always plan the number and placement of UV units to make sure all the pond water circulates through a UV unit at least once every 3 hours with more frequency being all the better.

Bioi Material plus Filtration and **Maintenance**

The presentation topic for the January 2019 club meeting was Filtration Basics. The presentation materials can be found on the AKC's Facebook page. At the top left of the page, select the "Files" section. You will then see a list of documents that have been uploaded. Anyone can download and read through the presentation materials. The essence of the presentation is that there are 3 main functions of a koi pond water treatment (pond filtration) system. The first step is mechanical cleaning of the water to capture and remove undissolved organic materials before the decompose. The second step is nitrification where media provide lots of surface are to house bacteria that convert ammonia to nitrite to nitrate. Nitrification media can be anything from plastic bits, to sheets of matting to ceramic media. It is very hard to beat ceramic media in a shower for nitrification. The exact maintenance details for cleaning the filtration devices will vary by the type of device such as a sieve, a bead filter, or tank of matting sheets. Typically the filter chamber should be dumped and rinsed once a week when doing a water change of at least 10%.
